NLRB legal threat seeks new venue

SpaceX has filed a second lawsuit in Texas challenging the constitutionality of the National Labor Relations Board, after its first lawsuit was transferred from Texas to California in April.

The new complaint rehashes two arguments that SpaceX made in its initial legal action: that the NLRB's members and the agency's administrative law judges are largely immune from being fired and are impermissibly shielded from removal by the President.

The new lawsuit is a second attempt to have these constitutional claims heard in the Fifth Circuit in Texas, a more corporate-friendly court known for its zeal in curtailing federal agencies' power.

SpaceX, founded by Elon Musk, as well as Amazon, Trader Joe's and Starbucks, have all argued in court that the now-worker-friendly NLRB under the Biden Administration should not exist. Faced with an accusation by the National Labor Relations Board that SpaceX improperly fired nine employees in 2022, among other illegal acts, the company filed a lawsuit in federal court in Texas to declare the NLRB's action - indeed, the board itself – unconstitutional.

Established in the 1930s under the National Labor Relations Act. the NLRB can appoint judges to rule on unfair labor practice charges against employers, and recommend penalties.

"Challenges to the constitutionality of the National Labor Relations Act have been litigated before, with the ourts generally disregarding the specious arguments of antiunion employers," wrote John Nichols for The Nation. The difference today: Musk, the second-richest man in the world and a professed union-hater, is circumventing the legislative process and is going straight to the courts for relief where ultimately, a conservative, potentially sympathetic Supreme Court would have the final say. Labor unions and others see gutting the NLRA as a move that would have negative, far-reaching implications on all manner of workplace issues, including safety and working conditions. "A growing number of deeppocket, low-road employers are jumping on the bandwagon, seeking preliminary injunctions in courts, solely to slow (us) down or prevent us from engaging in our enforcement actions against them because they have the money to do so," said Jennifer Abruzzo, acting general counsel of the NLRB.

New transit center looks like a barn. There's a reason for that...

DETROIT – A dramatic adaptation of the historic Dairy Cattle Barn on the grounds of the former Michigan State Fairground has yielded an unlikely new use for the old barn: a much-needed modern transit center that has buses traversing where prize cows, sheep and other livestock once chewed their cud.

Opening earlier this month, the \$31 million project has been managed by Ideal Contracting. Its subcontractors and building trades union workers have built the new Jason Hargrove Transit Center utilizing the structure of the 100-year-old barn. It will serve both Detroit Department of Transportation and regional SMART riders, as well as ride-share customers and those

History doesn't repeat: UAW loses vote at second Southern plant

VANCE, Ala. (PAI) - Despite an election loss at the Mercedes-Benz plant in Vance, Ala., Auto Workers President Shawn Fain says the union will continue to campaign there, and to keep organizing at other "transplant" foreign auto firms throughout the union-resistant South.

Complete but unofficial returns showed UAW lost by a 56-44 percent margin, garnering 2,045 pro-union votes to 2,642 for "no union." The Alabama loss comes after the union broke through, on its third try, at another Southern "transplant," the Volkswagen plant in Chattanooga, Tenn. Each factory is the largest one for that automaker in the U.S.

The UAW won the Chattanooga vote by a 3-to-1 ratio, and it was the first Southern auto plant in history to vote for union representation.

Despite the numerical loss, Fain touted gains the workers won as Mercedes scrambled to combat the union campaign. They include abolition of the company's two-

tier wage system - a key win for UAW in its earlier Stand Up campaign against the Detroit automakers- and Mercedes' removal of its U.S. CEO "who didn't care" about the workers.

And then the company urged the workers to give that CEO's successor a chance, and that argument helped it win among the Vance plant's workers. So did a "more aggressive" anti-union campaign by Mercedes bosses than by their VW counterparts, Fain said.

"They had captive audience meetings" right up until the eve of the three-day vote," Fain said at the May 17 press conference. "They brought in outsiders, they were firing workers, and they were threatening workers.

"Both the U.S. and the German governments are investigating Mercedes's labor lawbreaking at the Vance plant," Fain said, and he later announced the UAW would formally ask the National Labor Relations Board to overturn the results and order a rerun election due to the firm's (Continued on Page 3)

Employers often lament the presence of "third parties" in labor-management relationships, and the term invariably applies to unions.

So it goes with the protest du-jour over new worker-friendly policies and regulations being

ated General Contractors. Those and other groups signed onto a lawsuit filed May 21 in federal court against OSHA. The lawsuit challenges the agency's new "walkaround" rule, which "forces contractors to let potentially anyone, regardless of safety training, construction experience or intent to accompany a federal safety inspector on a jobsite," the AGC said.

State retains solid jobless numbers

April's unemployment rate in Michigan was 3.9 percent for the third straight month, according to the state's Center for Data and Analytics. For the month, that rate matches the national jobless rate, which rose by 0.1 percent.

Over the past year, the U.S. jobless rate has risen by 0.5 percent, while Michigan's rate rose 0.3 percent. They are still historically low numbers: a year ago the federal jobless rate was the lowest it has been since 1969's 3.5 percent.

Michigan added 15,000 jobs in April, with construction one of the leading sectors, adding 4,000 jobs.

The lawsuit, predictably, was filed in what has become the go-to court for dependable conservative, pro-employer rulings: the Western District of Texas.

"By allowing outside union agents access to nonunion employers' private property, OSHA is injecting itself into labormanagement disputes and casting doubt on its status as a neutral enforcer of the law," said Greg Sizemore, ABC's vice president of health, safety, environment and workforce development. "This final rule negatively impacts the rights of employers while simultaneously ignoring the rights of the majority of employees who have not authorized a union to represent them."

And charitably, if not a bit absurdly, Sizemore also expressed concern for all the potential dangers that could confront a person closely following an OSHA inspector on a jobsite visit.

"OSHA's rule also poses unnecessary risk to the individual joining the inspection and others on the jobsite if the authorized person is not trained to safely walk a construction jobsite," he said. "The rule does not include any requirement that the authorized person be equipped or conduct themselves to the same standards as OSHA safety (Continued on Page 3)

'Access' program a good start for young painter

Welcome to the International Union of Painters and Allied Trades, Cherish Cain.

A 19-year-old resident of Battle Creek, Cain has completed the Access for All program, a no-cost, 300-hour program that prepares participants for a career in construction. Cain's participation was sponsored in part by the Southeast Michigan Building Trades, whose representatives helped ease her way into finding a place in the union trades.

"From what I've seen, Cherish is definitely on the right track," said Scott Mikulen, a business representative with Local 514 of the Michigan District Council of Painters and Allied Craftworkers. He's also president of the Southeast Michigan Building Trades. "She's a fine young lady, and she has done well enough to get hired by a contractor to go onto a new project in West Virginia."


The origins of the Access for All program date to the 1970s,

when its forerunner was established by the Michigan AFL-CIO. It then evolved into the Workforce Development Institute.

The program focuses on providing employment and training services to displaced workers and economically disadvantaged adults and welfare recipients. The group also provides support for basic needs such as transportation and child care, and a small stipend for expenses during the training, as well as career planning and coaching.

Graduates earn credentials in: OSHA 30, First Aid/CPR, and Asbestos, Lead and Silica Awareness and a nationally recognized certificate from the North America's Building Trades (Continued on Page 13)

Bezos, Musk vs. workers

Two of the world's richest men want to end unions once and for all.

Musk's SpaceX and Bezos' Amazon are both arguing in court that the National Labor Relations Board is unconstitutional on the grounds that it combines judicial and executive functions.

The NLRB is the agency that supervises union organizing and collective bargaining as established by the National Labor Relations Act of 1935 – a cornerstone of FDR's New Deal that guarantees the right of workers to organize. It is, in effect, the referee of labor management relations.

If Bezos and Musk get their way, two of the richest people in the world will have gutted the enforcement of labor laws designed to protect the right of average workers to unionize. Corporations could fire employees who try to organize, without any repercussions. It could also be a death knell to unions that already exist.

Corporate giants Starbucks and Trader Joe's have similarly advanced their own legal arguments echoing the same anti-union, anti-worker sentiment. So much for being "progressive" companies, huh?

Beyond their copycat legal arguments, what do all of these corporations have in common? A history of bashing unions and preventing workers from exercising their right to organize.

The NLRB has charged these companies with hundreds of violations of workers' rights. They've fired pro-union workers, retaliated against organizers by cutting their hours, closed stores that tried to unionize, denied benefits being provided to non-union workers, and refused to bargain. And now Musk and Bezos are even going after the referees - the NLRB - so unions and workers don't stand a chance.

It's not the first time their argument has been trotted out by robber barons. A similar case made its way to the Supreme Court way back in 1937. The opinion in that case upheld the NLRB and its decision to punish steel barons who fired workers who tried to organize a union.

Modern-day robber barons Bezos and Musk are hoping today's Supreme Court will reverse its 1937 ruling and return America to a time before workers had a referee to ensure their rights.

Evidently, it's not enough for Bezos and Musk to amass more wealth than any two people on the planet. No, they want even more wealth and covet even more power - and don't want to share it with their workers.

You see, unions are one of the greatest champions of equality. And unions don't just help unionized workers - they help all workers.

There's a ripple effect that occurs when workers organize: nonunion workers often receive the benefits of higher wages and safer working conditions fought for by organized labor. Unions also play a political role: They provide countervailing power to the overwhelming political power of giant corporations. We will all suffer if unions are not there to have the backs of workers.

Now these cases may take a while to snake their way through the courts.

In the meantime, please know that these corporations win this fight only if the public doesn't know what's happening.

And support your local unions. When they go on strike, join a picket line. Better yet, join a union if you can.

We all need to voice our support for organized labor now more than ever.

The building will offer not only fully indoor service for transit users, but also restroom facilities, retail and community space, as well as outdoor public gathering areas featuring the preserved south portico of the former State Fair Coliseum.

"We listened to the community and instead of just saying it can't be done, we took the extra steps to make it happen," said Tyrone Clifton, director of the Detroit Building Authority. "The team has gone to great lengths to ensure the architectural integrity of these structures was preserved and the final product is going to be nothing short of beautiful. We think Detroiters will be proud."

Located east of Woodward and south of Eight Mile Road, the new 52,000-square-foot transit center is named for Jason Hargrove, a Detroit Department of Transportation bus driver. Early in the COVID-19 pandemic, he posted a video about a maskless passenger coughing on him. The video, which amassed millions of views, showed Hargrove urging members of the public to be more respectful and considerate toward bus drivers. Just 10 days after he posted the video, on April 1, 2020, he died from COVID. The new transit center honors his memory, and replaces the nearby State Fair Transit Hub.

fact an option," said a city press release. "The study was done after community members expressed their desire for the city to find a way to preserve these pieces of Michigan history."

The breezy center of the structure does not have doors, and acts as a through-way for buses and other vehicles to load passengers and drop them off under the roof. Both sides of the transformed structure now contain "conditioned spaces" - a lobby and public waiting area, a ticket office, transit offices, 24/7 bathrooms, and a lunch area/ lounge for bus drivers.

"As you can see it's a wideopen building, and the existing structure was in very good shape," Dyer said. "We tried to maintain the historic nature of the building as best we could."

A steel roof that had been installed in the early 2000s was still in good condition, so it was kept, and maintenance repairs on this project extended its life. After significant interior demolition, new windows, walls, insulation, electrical, plumbing and HVAC were installed, as were new foundations.

About half of the space is reserved for future build-out, focused on tenants perhaps opening a sundry store or coffee shop.

Hargrove left behind a widow and six children. Mayor Mike Duggan requested the City Council's re-naming of the building. "Jason was a hero to all of us," Duggan said, "and for the next 100 years, he will be remembered by everyone who uses this beautiful new transit center."



BUILDING MICHIGAN: 16 hydro-powered lights in Grand Rapids HISTORY IN THE MAKING By Marty Mulcahy



UTILIZING THE FLOW of the Grand River, the Grand Rapids Electric Light and Power Hydroelectric Plant produced electricity for more than 70 years. It was the first hydro plant in the world to provide commercial electric service. This photo dates to between 1896 and April 1903. Buildings from left to right include the William T. Powers' Sawmill (built in 1868), the hydroelectric power plant with steam-engine backup system (1880-81), the city lighting plant (1881), and a north brick building (possibly late-1880s). Grand Valley State University property now occupies the site.

When we think of electrical generation plants today, whether they're coal-fired, or powered by nuclear fission or natural gas, their owners often rate their electrical output in terms of the number of households they energize. One megawatt, for example, can power about 750 homes.

Today, Michigan-based power production in the summer amounts to about 30,538 megawatts, and our total energy production ranks us No. 27 among the states.

But let's go back to a time when power production was certainly more limited, and actually a lot more relatable. Some small American homes may have only 16 lights, and that's exactly how many were lit for the first time on July 24, 1880, to provide illumination for a handful of businesses in Grand Rapids. That bright idea earned Furniture City an under-the-radar distinction.

"Grand Rapids lays claim to the first hydroelectric power plant in the world, and the first to supply commercial electric lighting service," writes Jon Harrison, a retired Michigan State University librarian writing for the Michigan Day by Day history blog. "Among the big figures in the use of water power for the city's infant furniture industry was William T. Powers, an enterprising manufacturer.'

In 1847, Powers and his family moved to Grand Rapids from New Hampshire. He began making furniture on the Grand River above Bridge Street, and his mechanical tinkering soon led to the use of harnessed river water to power his shop, the Wolverine Chair and Furniture Co. He later entered into a partnership with Ebenezer Ball, and together they formed the furniture manufacturing company **Powers and Ball.** "In 1865 and 1866," Harrison wrote, Powers "purchased the necessary river frontage and in the two following years constructed the West Side Water Power Canal, completing it in September 1868." According to the Grand Rapids Public Museum, Powers built a west side canal on riverfront land he acquired that ran from Seventh St. NW to the present-day Blue Bridge, about three-fourths of a mile. Powers & Ball constructed the first factory on the canal, a planing mill, and sash and door operation. Several operations would line the canal as tenants to take advantage of waterpower. Powers became interested in electricity after he had heard of an exhibit to take place at the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia in 1877, featuring an electric carbon-arc lighting system. Thus inspired, Powers then organized the Grand Rapids Electric Light & Power Co. on March 22, 1880. According to The Center for Land Use Interpretation Newsletter, Winter 2023, Powers teamed with Charles Brush of Cleveland, to generate electricity by a Brush dynamo belted to a water wheel. Brush's dynamos were used to power arc lighting that was used in various cities. The system was used to light Niagara Falls in 1879, but that was not considered a commercial venture. "What some consider the first commercial hydroelectric plant in the USA was not at Niagara Falls, but at the Midwestern city of Grand Rapids, Michigan, where, in July 1880 the Grand Rapids Electric Light and Power Company began operations," said the Land Use group. "Power came from a

turbine at the Wolverine chair factory, driven by a waterwheel in the West Side Power Canal, next to the factory. DC electricity produced there was wired to 16 electric arc lamps that illuminated outdoor street lights in front of a strip of businesses, including clothing stores, a hotel, and an opera house."

Brush's patented dynamo was sold to several cities for public lighting. A year after his dynamos were installed in Grand Rapids, they were placed in New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Montreal, Buffalo, San Francisco and Cleveland. His generators were reliable and automatically increased voltage with greater load while keeping current constant.

Brush's Grand Rapids dynamo, the Land Use group said, was moved to Powers' sawmill at the downstream end of the canal, and increased output by the installation of a new 40-light generator. Growth of the business by the city street lighting contract March 1881, justified even more extensive operations."

As reported by History Grand Rapids, an article in the Grand Rapids Eagle said at the time, "The light was a grand success, strong, steady, white and uniform. It called thousands of people on to the streets and into places lighted by it, and it was admired and enjoyed by all. Some complained that it was too bright and made their eyes ache and dazzled them; but such had looked directly at the light. The German government is investigating Mercedes under a new law there that opens such probes of subsidiaries and suppliers, even if they're not in Germany, for breaking that republic's much more pro-worker labor laws.

"This is a fight we had to take on" to lift the living standards not just of the Mercedes workers in Alabama but of other oppressed and exploited workers in the union-hostile South, and not just in the auto industry, Fain said. The union has campaigns going in South Carolina, Tennessee (again) and Georgia, but Fain did not identify the corporate targets of those drives.

Like the VW workers in Chattanooga, the Mercedes workers at Vance came to the UAW for help and organizing aid after the union achieved massive gains in its rolling "Stand Up" strikes against the Detroit auto firms, Ford, GM and Stellantis, formerly FiatChrysler.

Those gains not only abolished the two-tier wage systems, but ensured workers could move to top-scale pay faster, increased

prior wage losses, since the financier-caused 2008 Great Recession sent GM and Fiat-Chrysler into bankruptcy reorganization. Those gains also improved health care and added other benefits.

About the only goal UAW didn't achieve in the Stand Up strikes was a 32-hour workweek for 40 hours pay. Auto workers, both at the Detroit 3 and at the transplants, routinely work 60, 70 or 80 hours weekly, the union says.

Fain used the press conference about the vote to once again point out hurdles and hoops and outright lies workers face when they try to unionize anywhere in the U.S. Already weak U.S. labor laws have become even more loophole-ridden since the National Labor Relations Act's enactment in 1935, thanks to Republican-majority Congresses and corporate lawsuits in courts.

That's led organized labor to make comprehensive labor law reform its No. 1 congressional priority, through enactment of the Protect the Right to Organize (PRO) Act. It would abolish captive audience meetings, impose higher fines for illegal firings, discipline and other labor law-breaking.

It would also legalize cardpensions and restored 15 years of check recognition of a union,

Contractor groups riled as OSHA widens potential pool of jobsite inspectors

inspectors. Further, the final rule fails to answer who is legally responsible if the third party gets injured during the inspection or harms someone else.'

Sizemore added that OSHA can have a bigger impact on jobsite safety by fostering positive partnerships with employers and promoting safety practices. "Simply put," he said, "OSHA's overreach does nothing to promote workplace health and safety, but instead pushes the administration's 'all-of-government' agenda to encourage unions and collective bargaining.'

Other plaintiffs joining the AGC and ABC in the lawsuit include local chambers of commerce in Texas, as well as the National Association of Manufacturers, National Association of Wholesaler-Distributors, National Federation of Independent Business and National Retail Federation.

The American Federation of Government Employees union said the new rule applies to both private and public workplaces and "acknowledges the important role of worker representatives in making workplaces safer."

'This rule gives workers better health and safety protections because they can choose outside representation from the union at the district or national level or experts in the occupational health and safety field," said AFGE Health and Safety Specialist Milly Rodriguez. "It will be useful in situations where the local has not yet developed its own health and safety representative or where employees might be in fear of reprisal for raising health and safety concerns during an OSHA inspection."

when independent outside verifiers report that more than half a plant's workers have signed NLRB union election authorization cards, rather than giving bosses a chance to mount intensive - and lie-filled - anti-union campaigns, as Mercedes did, to erode support.

"This is a fight all of labor has to take on," Fain added. "These workers" at the Vance plant "work hard. They deliver. They make a quality product and we'll keep supporting them."

Fain, an Indianan, quoted a fellow Hoosier, the late and famed college basketball coach John Wooden, to explain why UAW would continue its campaign to organize the transplants in the South. It's budgeted \$40 million for the first two years of that effort.

"John Wooden said 'Success is peace of mind. But success is never final and failure is never fatal.'

AFL-CIO President Liz Shuler said "the entire AFL-CIO family stands with the workers and organizers in Tuscaloosa. They put their heart and soul into the fight to join a union, resisting every union-busting tactic in the book-and they made huge strides. Like their fellow autoworkers at Volkswagen who lost their first vote, these brave workers have built a foundation that will only grow stronger in the coming months."

(Continued from Page 1) projects. Meanwhile, inflexible rules for sourcing materials could drive up prices for federally aided projects such as highways."

Those inflexible rules he referenced referred to the Biden Administration's "Buy American" requirements for highway construction contracts.

"Inflation had been unexpectedly high in the first three months of this year after having steadily dropped in the second half of 2023. The elevated readings had dimmed hopes that the worst bout of inflation in four decades was being tamed and raised concerns that prices could spike again," the AGC said.

was the first in the nation to be driven by a waterwheel, with power provided to more than one business. The group said a direct current Edison plant at a mill in Appleton, Wis., which opened in 1882, bills itself as the "first commercial central station hydroelectric plant in world" because it more clearly sold its power to a variety of commercial and residential customers, more like future hydroelectric plants would.

But powering the 16 arc lights in Grand Rapids was the start of the industry. The carbon arc lamp, which consists of an arc between carbon electrodes, was the predecessor to the modern light bulb. It created a super bright light that was more suited for exterior applications.

"On Saturday evening, July 24, 1880, 16 electric lights glowed in Campau Place," says Grand Rapids at the Dawn of Hydroelectric Power by James R. Winslow. "The first businesses illuminated were Sweet's Hotel, Powers' Opera House, E. S. Pierce's Clothing, Spring & Company Dry Goods, Mill & Lacey Drugs, A. Preusser's Jewelry and Star Clothing. The brilliant electric lights proved such a draw for merchants, that demand outgrew the capacity, and the machine

the lanterns any more than they now do at the sun."

With demand growing for more lighting, Powers transferred water rights from the West Side Water Power Company to Grand Rapids Electric Light & Power, whose generation capacity was 240 horsepower. A bigger, permanent powerhouse was completed Nov. 1, 1881. That plant had a steam engine backup – a nod to customers wanting consistent power, and the fact that the river's flow was sometimes low or froze in the winter.

The Grand Rapids Electric Light and Power Co. had 700 arc lights and 3,500 incandescent lights in operation in 1897. There were two other electric utilities in Grand Rapids at the time, Peninsula Light Power and Heat Co. and Edison Electric Light Co. In 1902 the newly organized Grand Rapids Edison Co. absorbed all three companies.

The Grand Rapids hydro plant saw its last major addition in 1917. In 1949 the plant was jointly owned by Consumers Power and Voigt Milling Co., the only two companies drawing power from the plant. By Feb. 29, 1956, when Consumers Power decommissioned the facility, it was only being used as a reserve power plant.

'You're 80 years old and you've never made confession before?


No, in fact I'm Jewish." "Well, in that case, why are you here telling me all this?"


"Construction input prices jumped half a percentage point higher in April and have increased 3.5 percent over the first four months of the year," said ABC Chief Economist Anirban Basu. "While iron, steel, asphalt and gypsum product prices fell in April, oil and copper prices surged, driving the monthly increase. Rising input prices will put pressure on profits at a time when nearly one in four contractors expect their margins to contract over the next two quarters, according to the ABC's Construction Confidence Index."

It is the contractor's responsibility to issue one in accordance with our contract.

S.U.B. BENEFITS: Report to the hall promptly upon layoff. You must complete a S.U.B. Application within seven (7) days from your layoff date or you will forfeit S.U.B. benefits. Lay-off slips must accompany the application to be eligible. Proof of UIA benefit payments must be submitted within 21 days of when you were paid in order to receive SUB benefits. Do not submit your sub applications directly to the fund office. Your application must be signed by the hall or you will not collect benefits.

OUT-OF-WORK LIST: You must be on the out-of-work list to collect S.U.B. benefits or SASMI. Members must re-register biannually: March 1 through March 20 and Sept. 1 through Sept. 20. If you fail to re-register you will be removed from the list.

'Legacy' asbestos lives on, despite EPA's ban

· Asbestos in diaphragms used to make sodium hydroxide and chlorine for disinfecting water. The EPA notes there are ways to disinfect water or make chlorine without the use of asbestos.

"Asbestos has harmed people across the country for decades, and under President Biden's leadership, we are taking decisive action to ban its use," said Brenda Mallory, chair of the White House's Council on Environmental Quality. "This action marks a major step to improve chemical safety after decades of inadequate protections." Legacy asbestos remains a risk to workers and consumers. Legacy asbestos refers to asbestos-containing materials or loose fibers still existing in old buildings, homes, appliances and other applications. For most of the 20th Century, asbestos was the go-to material for fireproofing buildings, dampening sound, strengthening pipes, increasing the durability of tiles and many other uses. Its use peaked in the 1970s before being restricted in the 1980s. The problem is that asbestos used in buildings and these other applications doesn't break down on its own. It has to be removed by hand – usually by construction workers.

'Access' program a good start for young painter

Union (NABTU). Their latest online dashboard counts 417 enrollees in Michigan and 266 graduates.

After working in Ann Arbor, Cain was kept on by contractor Evergreene Architectural Arts, which works on specialty projects across the country.

Here is Cherish's story, in her own words:

"I am 19 years old and a resident of Jackson, Mich. I have lived in Jackson my entire life and graduated from Jackson Senior High School in May 2023. At that time I had not decided on a career path, but I was certain that I did not want to continue my education in a formal college setting.

"I was introduced to the Access for All Pre-Apprenticeship program and was interested in the idea of working within the skilled trades. When I started the Access for All program, I did not know what to expect and I was very nervous. The coordinators of the program as well as the members of the building trades were all very welcoming, supporting and eager to help guide me on my journey. I completed a three-month course which provided me an in-depth look into the types of work that are defined as skilled trades.

"During my time in the program I found that I was very interested in painting. It caught my attention instantly and as I continued the course, I found that I really enjoyed learning the processes and wanted o pursue a career as a trade painter.

"Upon my completion of the Access for All program, I was introduced to Scott Mikulen, a business representative with the International Union of Painters and Allied Trades Local 514. Scott facilitated a connection with a designer who was working on a restoration project at the historic Michigan Theater in Ann Arbor. I was offered the opportunity to be an apprentice during this project. The Southeast Michigan Building Trades donated paint rollers, brushes, painters' attire, as well as a work bag to ensure that I would begin my apprenticeship with all the necessary tools for my chosen trade.

"Upon the completion of the Michigan Theater project, I was asked to stay on with Evergreene Architectural Arts, In. and travel to Huntington, W. Va., where I will continue my apprenticeship as a decorative painter. I have accepted the offer and look forward to continuing to learn more about my trade.

'I am very thankful for all the support that I have received and excited to continue my journey with the skilled trades."

That's why construction workers have historically been on the frontlines of diseases caused by asbestos exposure.

LIUNA members and other construction workers performing maintenance, renovation and demolition work on older buildings and bridges can be at risk for exposure to asbestos. OSHA's asbestos standard for the construction industry outlines the steps contractors must take to protect workers during this type of work. LIUNA's network of training centers across the U.S. and Canada - led by the LIUNA Training and Education Fund - offer asbestos abatement courses and training to ensure that LIUNA members can remove this dangerous substance while protecting their health.

"The hard-working LIUNA members who build, maintain and demolish our infrastructure are grateful to President Biden for prioritizing the lives, health and safety of construction workers with this ban," said LIUNA General President Brent Booker. "This is a giant step forward but it will not end until we have completely removed asbestos from each and every workplace."

In the press release banning chrysotile asbestos, the EPA noted it's also evaluating other types of asbestos - including legacy uses - in its risk evaluation as part of the Toxic Substances Control Act. That evaluation is due to be finalized by Dec. 1, 2024.



On a crisp, bright Saturday in early April at Detroit's Rouge Park, a small army of volunteers were ready to work.

Shovels? Check! Strong arms? Check! Trees ready to go into the ground? Check and check again. Staci Reed and other members of Alpha Kappa Alpha sorority were among those volunteers, planting cherry trees to establish an urban orchard at the popular 1,184-acre city park, which also includes walking trails, recreation areas and pools.

"We're here to help make the city of Detroit more green and more beautiful than it already is," Reed said, shovel in hand.


Planting a tree can create a lasting and lovely effect on the environment, with many benefits including cleaner water and air. And the early spring months of April and May are prime times for tree planting.

Michigan celebrated Arbor Day on April 26, and Gov. Gretchen Whitmer declared the week of April 21-27 as Arbor Week.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources has pledged to lead Michiganders in planting more than 50 million trees by 2030 through the Mi Trees program.

That effort is already well under way, with 17 million trees planted by the DNR in state forests since 2021. An additional 112,000 trees have been planted by volunteers in other public and private landscapes like yards, fields, parks and school grounds across the state.

"We want to help everybody think about getting out there and planting trees," said Kevin Sayers, urban and community forestry program coordinator for the DNR. "A well-placed tree or trees can beautify the neighborhood or the landscape, cool your home in summer and help clean

air and water."

Choose your tree and location.

Planting a tree this spring will benefit you today – and oth-

ers in the future – if you choose your tree and your location carefully and provide basic care as your tree grows.

If you live in the city, you might want to stay away from planting maples, for example. They're beautiful trees, grow well and provide fall color. But many Michigan cities already have a lot of maples on city streets and in parks.

"We want to try to get a good variety of trees out there so that if something comes along like Dutch elm disease or the emerald ash borer, we won't see treeless streets," said Lawrence Sobson, urban and community forester with the DNR.

Dutch elm disease wiped out stately elms lining many Michigan streets starting in the 1950s, and the ash borer, an invasive insect, has destroyed millions of ash trees over the past 20 years or so.

Also rethink your childhood memories of street trees.

You may remember growing up with ash, silver maple or Bradford pears, but those oncepopular trees have been nudged out by others that work better or stay healthier in Michigan's environment.

Experts advise planting a variety of trees that will provide benefits to you and your community, like native trees that help support wildlife, large shade

trees that help cool your home in the summer and ornamental and fruit trees to beautify your

landscape. "I love black gum, also called black tupelo trees," Sobson said. "Those are your maple replacements right there. They're easy to maintain, they don't get super wide, they're readily available in a lot of different cultivars and they're a really, really nice tree."

For areas that are wet or flood, the hackberry is a good choice – it doesn't mind having

wet feet some of the time. "It's a good-sized tree that

is usually not expensive to buy," Sobson said.

Want cleaner air? A yellowwood could help.

"It's a really good air filter tree," Sobson said. "It has white flowers which are nice, wider branching and not super big."

Another hardy native tree that's good for urban landscapes is the Kentucky coffee tree.

"You can throw the kitchen sink at it and it will still live," Sobson said. "It's native to Michigan, it's climate-adaptable and it's slower-growing. In the winter it can look like the saddest little Charlie Brown tree, but it will come through."

A good choice for small spaces is ironwood. The tree grows slowly and stays compact. However, it's not always readily available in nurseries. Another smaller tree is serviceberry, also known as juneberry or sugar plum.

"It's good for wet areas, it's a utility-friendly tree, there are multi-stemmed varieties that aren't going to get very big," Sobson said.

Bonus: "The berries are tasty, and you can find these trees to buy anywhere," he said.

Plant with care. The same thing people say is important in real estate – "location, location, location" – also is important for trees. You don't want to plant a towering pine under a utility line,

that sewer lines. "You don't want to put in a

"You don't want to put in a tree and then have to take it out after a few years because you didn't plan it well," Sobson said.

Planting the tree you've chosen involves a lot more than just digging a hole the size of the pot and plopping the tree into it. Before putting a shovel in the ground, call 811 by phone or visit missdig811.org online. Workers will mark the locations of underground water, gas and other utility lines so you don't accidentally dig them up.

Then, dig the hole for your tree. Sorry to be the bearer of bad news, but it has to be big – make it two to three times the width of the root ball or container the tree is in. Don't go too deep, though. Keep your hole about the depth of the container or root ball.

"It's all about establishing a root system, and roots need space to spread out and get established," Sobson said.

If your tree is in a container, remove the container and then carefully shave off the outer roots so that new roots can sprout from the fresh cuts. For a tree that is balled and wrapped in burlap, place the tree in the hole and then remove and dispose of at least the top half of the burlap and wire cage.

Plant trees at a depth that allows you to cover roots but still see the flare at the bottom of the trunk.

Once the tree is in the ground, water it well. Then come back and water regularly throughout the season. Water your new tree frequently and deeply the first year or two, especially if weather is hot and dry.

Water the entire area under the canopy of the tree, not just near the trunk. A layer of mulch will help protect tree roots, but don't mound it up so that it looks like a volcano or let much touch the tree trunk. That can damage the tree. Fertilizer isn't recommended for the first several years.

After you've put the shovel and the hose away, relax and enjoy watching your tree grow over time. And don't forget to pin your new planting on the DNR's interactive Mi Trees map.

"You're planting something that both you and future generations can enjoy," Sobson said.


