### **Overtime eligibility** expansion starts

More workers who have been denied overtime pay will now be eligible for extra money when they work longer hours.

New overtime pay protection rules from the U.S. Department of Labor kicked in July 1, based on a federal rule finalized in April. Now, workers making less than \$43,888 per year (the former threshold was \$35,500) are eligible for extra pay when they work long hours, putting more money in their pockets

Additionally, the Biden Administration has vowed to further extend these protections to another 3 million workers by increasing the overtime threshold to \$58,656 next year.

President Obama's Labor Department in 2016 doubled the salary threshold to about \$47,000. But a federal judge in Texas the

# **MI prevailing wage** law set to get power it has never had Finally... funding for enforcement


Editor LANSING-Prevailing wage was nonexistent in Michigan 17 months ago. Now it's back, and it's on the verge of getting superpowers.

The state House on June 26 adopted a bill that was previously approved in the state Senate (SB 571). The headline of the legislation is the requirement of the payment of prevailing wages on solar and wind energy projects in Michigan that exceed two megawatts. That will be a nice bonus for construction workers, **News from** who are poised to perform Lansing millions of hours of work in those green energy industries.

But the legislation, headed to the desk of Gov. Gretchen Whitmer for her to sign into law, also has extremely vital paperwork and new financial requirements of contractors bidding on state-

funded construction projects.

"That part of the bill is a massive victory," said Todd Tennis, an IBEW lobbyist for Capitol Services. "Actually, I think that having that language in

following year said that ceiling was so high that it could sweep in some management workers who are exempt from overtime pay protections, and struck it down. The Trump Administration's \$35,500 level was set in 2020.

"For more than 80 years. the 40-hour workweek has been a pillar of fairness for American workers," said Acting Secretary of Labor Julie Su. "Today, our rule to restore that balance by expanding overtime protections for our nation's lower-paid salaried workers goes into effect."

The new rule expands overtime eligibility to about 1 million workers.

### **1st Amazon union** links with Teamsters

NEW YORK (PAI) - By a resounding margin, voting members of the two-year-old independent Amazon Labor Union formally affiliated with the Teamsters, after a three-day vote that ended June 17. The tally was 829-14.

The ALU will become semi-autonomous Amazon Labor Union/IBT Local 1. The fledgling union broke through warehouse-retail monster's antiworker, anti-union blockade with the nation's first win in a National Labor Relations Boardrun vote more than a year ago.

But they realized their union, started on almost a literal shoestring after Amazon fired union founder Chris Smalls on trumped-up charges of endangering colleagues during the pandemic, couldn't go it alone. Amazon has since spent several million dollars on union-busters to defeat the union at a second Staten Island warehouse.

# No construction slowdown in Michigan, or elsewhere

Michigan, somehow, found 15,900 construction workers to hire during the 12 months prior to May 2024. That represents an 8.4 percent increase in hiring, which was the third-highest percentage among the states during those 12 months.

The federal Bureau of Labor Statistics released the latest employment numbers on June 25.

The House bill, sponsored by state Rep. Karen Whitsett (D-Detroit), was adopted on a party line vote with all Democrats voting yes and Republicans voting no (56-54). "When we look at 20 weeks, it's actually not a lot of time," Whitsett said. "Twenty six weeks is definitely something that needs to happen. We're just taking it back, and just bringing back something that needed to be there in the first place."

Predictably, business groups and Republican lawmakers lined up against the legislation, urging its defeat in the state Senate when it re-convenes in September.

"There are jobs out there, so I'm not sure why this change is in any way needed," said state Rep. Ken Borton (R-Gaylord) "It shouldn't take anyone six months to find a new job. You could drive down the main street of any Michigan town and see at least a handful of help-wanted signs."

Amanda Fisher, National Federation of Independent Business Michigan state director, said "small business owners continue to struggle to find workers and survive a difficult economic climate; this legislation is a slap in the face.'

Of course, business owners struggling to find workers is historically uncommon. Michigan was among the states worst day after a new Florida law became effective, affected in the years before and after the "Great Recession" (officially from 2007-2009), yet the state GOP chose to cut benefit weeks at a time that was particularly difficult for workers seeking employment. And during the first pandemic year of 2020, Michigan

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The U.S. Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) released final rules June 18 that mandate union-friendly prevailing wage and registered apprenticeship requirements for projects under the Inflation Reduction Act.

The final rules are expected to boost employment for highly-skilled workers to support the growth of clean energy jobs – and make sure they are good-paying jobs.

The Inflation Reduction Act contains incentives for construction of clean energy projects. Since the act's passage in 2022, announced federal investments in clean energy projects have projected the creation of more than 270,000 jobs, and the Biden Administration said studies project that more (Continued on Page 14)

# Why we have work to do

Summer is here, and with it comes longer days, hotter temperatures and the proliferation of orange construction barrels across Michigan. Sure, that can mean traffic, detours and a longer commute in the short term, but when I see those barrels, I see my skilled trades brothers and sisters hard at work building the state's brighter future.

They are busier than ever, turning more than \$12 billion from President Joe Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, Inflation Reduction Act and Chips and Science Act into a strong foundation for growth. # MSU's flexible Multicultural Center

(Continued from Page 1) what is incorporated and how it will be used.'

The two-story center is located at Shaw and Farm lanes, on one of the few available plots of land remaining on MSU's inner campus. Multicultural space has been allotted in campus buildings in the past, but this is the first standalone version.

The university said calls by the student body "for a freestanding multicultural center on MSU's campus date back to the civil rights movement when protests were sparked by the demands of Black students who called for increasing racial and ethnic minority representation on campus."

Said Vice President and Chief Diversity Officer Jabbar R. Bennett, Ph.D: "This effort exemplifies our leadership's commitment to deliver on our intention to create a diverse, equitable and inclusive world-class academic environment.'

The Multicultural Center's designer, the SmithGroup, said the building's large, cantilevered entrance overhang leads to a two-story "living room," a "large communal gathering space that students had long sought, allowing them to host events and performances of cultural expression on site, rather than renting another facility. The living room features a light well that brings

natural light into the center of the building and doubles as a beacon to the surrounding campus."

A "collaboration stair" doubles as event seating. The SmithGroup said a "community kitchen" serves as the social hub of the second floor allowing for students to commune around foods that are representative of their diverse heritage and cultures. This communal area is flanked by meeting areas for student organizations and more private spaces for those seeking seclusion for respite." The center includes reflection rooms for meditation or prayer, ablution station (for body washing as part of religious rites), toilet rooms that service both non-binary and binary students, and "hotel" space for office work.

A tiered amphitheater allows for performances where students can gather for cultural dance, music and events. A ceremonial area is designed into the site, near the Red Cedar River, allowing First Nations to hold fire ceremonies for the first time on campus.

Clark Construction Project Supt. John Fillion called it "a unique building, and it will provide a great layout for everything that the university is seeking to do with the space." He said 40-50 tradespeople have been on site

in recent weeks. "They're doing a great job; they're the best in the area," he said. "They're committed to building a wonderful building, and they're paying a lot of attention to quality and details."

MSU's Mullen similarly lauded the work of Clark, White and their subcontractors. "The performance of Clark/White has been fantastic," Mullen said. "We award contracts based on quality, value and experience, and Clark has consistently been working on our campus projects, for good reason."

Mullen said he has "never seen a project with such a large and diverse group of stakeholders. All their input has been very positive, but it has also been very challenging."

#### MSU said in 2019, several student organizations presented a plan to increase diversity, equity and inclusion on campus that included a free-standing multicultural center. A steering committee conducted a feasibility study. A series of community engagement sessions helped bring about design concepts. That has translated into maintaining maximum architectural flexibility into the building, as design and use suggestions from students evolved over time - if for no other reason than some students graduated.

Turns out, building a campus multicultural center is fulfilling a wish for a significant number of students at Michigan State. "Not a day goes by without a student walking by and saying thank you" for building the center, Fillion said.

This convoluted codeword also allows the tricksters to brag openly about their cleverness to their Wall Street investors. Here's Coca-Cola's CEO, for example, doing corporate-speak to bankers in February: "We are leveraging our revenue growth management capabilities to tailor our offerings and price pack architecture to meet consumers' evolving needs."

English translation: Consumers will need to pay us more for less Coke. You could almost hear the bankers weep for joy

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
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# **BUILDING MICHIGAN:** The Huron Islands Lighthouse **HISTORY IN THE MAKING** By Marty Mulcah

Want to get away to a quiet place, far from the maddening crowds?

Michigan's 3,288 linear miles of Great Lakes shoreline offers ample quiet spots to get away from it all. If you're really adventuresome - and seeking maximum solitude – you can also find an uninhabited island to visit within our state's borders. And if you don't mind one with a blinking beacon, consider a visit to Lighthouse Island, which hosts the lofty Huron Islands Lighthouse, whose white light is at the tallest focal plane in the western Great Lakes. Built on a bluff, it rises 198 feet above Lake Superior in the Huron Islands, a tiny, hazardous archipelago off the shores of Marquette County.

"The Huron Islands," says Lighthouse Friends, "are a group of eight small, rocky islands in Lake Superior, located roughly three miles offshore from the Upper Peninsula. In 1863, a committee was dispatched to the Great Lakes to determine the necessity of a few newly proposed lighthouses and the desirability of re-establishing discontinued lights. While examining these predetermined sites, the committee also noted the need for additional lights on Lake Superior to support the growing copper and iron ore trade of the Keweenaw Peninsula. One of these additional lights was recommended for the Huron Islands."

conditions around the islands to the public's attention, and the intensity of pleas for a light on the Huron Islands increased in both frequency and fervor," Pepper wrote.

**Congress allocated money** for a survey of the site in 1866, and the crew selected West Huron Island as the best spot for a lighthouse. It had the highest elevation, but was "basically nothing more than an outcropping of convoluted solid granite rock with deep fissures and chasms," Pepper wrote. A clear title to the land was finally obtained, and in 1868 the lighthouse and an outhouse were constructed with a federal allocation of \$17,000. The "schoolhouse" design light station is a story-and-ahalf tall with a square light tower, 39 feet in height, integrated into the structure. The original light was a ten-sided lantern with a a 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-order Fresnel lens. According to Lighthouse Friends, a roadway was constructed from the island's shoreline to its 103-foot-summit by blasting away large quantities of rock and spanning chasms with wooden bridges, built using the small birch trees cut down on the island. "The lighthouse was constructed on a leveled site atop the island using rough-cut granite blocks taken from the island, with cut limestone serving as quoins (an external angle of a wall or building) on the structure's corners and as lintels above and below the doors and windows," said Lighthouse Friends. "Nearby Granite Island Lighthouse (about 10 miles southeast) was built in parallel with Huron Island Lighthouse using the same plans and with granite taken from the Huron Islands." Gull **Rock and Marquette Harbor** lights also share the design. 'Getting on and off the island was a constant problem," wrote Donald Nelson for Light-

house Digest. "Lifting-davits

for the sailboat were installed, as there were no docking facilities available.

"The two keepers assigned here would find it boring but constantly adventurous getting on and off. The 12-1/2 mile trip to Marquette for supplies and shore time would have to be made alone. Seagulls had made this desolate rock their home for many years and they were not about to relinquish this time-honored ownership to anyone. The keepers soon learned to live in harmony with their feathered companions."

A pair of fog signal buildings were constructed on the eastern end of the island in 1881, and then replacements were built in 1898-99. In 1883, a "Rock Island Line" tramway was built to help transport supplies to and from the shore. An oil house was built in 1896 to store fuel for the light.

In 1934 the station was electrified and the keeper's house was built next to the lighthouse. Today the site is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and is supported by the nonprofit Huron Island Lighthouse Preservation Association, "whose mission is to maintain the buildings, history and cultural significance of the Huron Island Lighthouse and associated buildings."

The Huron Islands were recognized by President Theodore Roosevelt as more than just a bunch of rocks sticking up out of Lake Superior. In 1905, he created the "Huron Islands Reservation" by signing an executive order that the "unsurveyed islands of the Huron islands group... are hereby reserved and set apart for the use... as a preserve and breeding ground for native birds." "The refuge was established in 1905 as a refuge and breeding ground for migratory birds and other wildlife, especially the herring gull, which had large nesting colonies on the islands," says the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. "These early bird sanctuaries were vital for several species of birds, including the herring gull, whose populations had been drastically reduced by plume hunters and egg collectors in the 1800s and early 1900s." Today, the service said, "all islands are closed to the public except for Lighthouse Island." The U.S. Coast Guard took over the operation of the lighthouse, fog signal building and other structures from the U.S. Lighthouse Service in 1950. In 1961, a barracks was built to house five Coast Guard crew members after the old lighthouse keepers quarters was deemed insufficient.

# MI prevailing wage law set to get power it has never had

(Continued from Page 1) in fact, paying their workers the prevailing wage.

Labor union representatives have long complained that nonunion contractors usually cannot be forced to produce worker payroll records without a court order. As a result, unscrupulous contractors – working under a prevailing wage law that lacks real enforcement – have been able to skirt around state laws and continue to win state contracts by under-paying workers.

The original Michigan Prevailing Wage Act became law in 1965. It was repealed by Republican lawmakers in 2018, and then reinstated last year by Democrats who won control of all levers of state government in November 2022.

And there's more good news for union and nonunion construction workers. The official review by the state House Legislative Analysis says the law "would require contractors and subcontractors to annually register with the state in order to be eligible for prevailing wage projects." Further, "contractors and subcontractors on state work would also have to submit certain wage and benefit information to a payroll database."

And the new law requires contractors to pay an annual fee in order to bid on state work. The money raised would be used to hire staff in the state Labor and Economic Opportunity Department – to enforce the state's prevailing wage law. Current estimates say that the fees would raise around \$4 million in onetime costs and \$1.1 million in ongoing revenue to the state.

"The ability to enforce the law is huge, this is going to make a real difference for our members," Tennis said. "And we have to give credit to Sean Egan, who had a huge role to play." Egan is deputy director- labor at LEO. An electrician by trade, he is also an attorney and former business manager of Muskegon IBEW Local 275. While LEO did not take a position on the legislation, Egan has been a loud, fierce advocate for working people in his role in state government.

Senate Bill 571 was introduced by state Sen. John Cherry (D-Flint), who told Michigan Building and Construction Trades Council Legislative Conference earlier this year that "I feel a great deal of fulfillment to be able to drive to Lansing and fight for working people in Michigan. In Michigan, for many years, the deck has been stacked against

unions and working people. In this past year, we have spent some time trying to unstack that deck."

Rep. Tom Kunse (R-Clare) expressed concern about imposing prevailing wage restrictions on private businesses. "The overreach here, the creep, has no end to it," he said.

Robert Joerg, director of government affairs for the Laborers' International Union of North America, told the news service MIRS that the bill would continue to ensure that contractors are properly compensated at the levels they are contractually obligated, limit instances of wage theft and improve transparency to the public.

"While the state currently has processes that do address some of these concerns, the centralization of contractor information in a single database will aid state agencies when they go out to bid for construction projects," he said, referring to a requirement that the department create a publiclyavailable database with contractor information, wage rates, starting and ending times and gross wages paid during a pay period.

There is also chatter in the Legislature about increasing the Unemployment Insurance weekly benefit amount from its current \$362 per week and tie annual increases to the inflation index. That \$362 per week maximum level was last raised, incredibly, in 2002.

"It's shameful that the state hasn't raised the benefit level," said IBEW lobbyist Todd Tennis of Capitol Services.

By the end of this legislative year, Tennis said organized labor's priorities in Lansing are to achieve the 26-week benefit level, raise the maximum jobless benefit level to somewhere in the \$650 per week range, and then to make sure the state Unemployment Agency's computer system no longer falsely accuses workers of fraud when it comes to claiming benefits.




Lighthouses had been popping up along the Great Lakes with regularity starting in the mid-19th Century to serve the burgeoning marine traffic. It soon became obvious that a hazardous dark spot was a shipping lane about 20 miles northeast of Marquette that led to the Portage Lake entry on the east side of the Keweenaw Peninsula.

'With this increasing vessel traffic," wrote Terry Pepper, a former executive director of the Great Lakes Lighthouse Keeper's Association, "the Huron Island chain represented a significant hazard to vessels making their way along the coast. Marking the turning point for vessels coasting in either direction between the lights of Marquette and Portage River, the islands were surrounded by dangerous shoals, were frequently enshrouded in pea-soup fogs, and had been the site of numerous shipwrecks over the years."

Among the most notorious wrecks involved the side-wheel steamer Arctic, which ran aground and was destroyed on the eastern-most island during a storm on May 29, 1860. The captain managed to get passengers, cattle and cargo safely ashore, but "newspaper coverage of the loss of the Arctic served to bring the dangerous

ACCIDENTAL DEATH and DISMEMBERMENT INSUR-ANCE FROM OUR INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION: Members who have their dues paid in advance (prior to the month of the accident) are eligible for benefits up to \$7,500.00. This benefit comes as a dues paying member of SMART International.

WEEKEND WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Saturday and Sunday work assignments. Please remember that when performing work on a Saturday or Sunday the steward must report it to the hall, give each member's name and obtain a form for signatures. Each member must sign the form along with the number of hours they worked. The completed form must be sent back to by hall by the end of the day on the following Monday. Weekend work assignments must be called or emailed into the hall prior to 3:00 pm on Friday.

WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Everyone must obtain a work assignment prior to starting work. If you fail to do so you could be written up on charges.

LAY-OFFS: All members must report to the Union Hall immediately upon lay-off, even if you only work one day. These are the By-Law rules for the Out-of-Work List. Your name will be removed from the list 14 days after receiving an assignment. It is very important to report to the union hall immediately after your layoff. Members get confused because the S.U.B. Fund allows you a period of up to seven (7) days to apply for S.U.B. benefits after lay-off.

LAY-OFF SLIPS/TERMINATION NOTICES: Lay off slips must accompany all applications for sub pay. Without lay off slips you cannot collect sub pay. It is the member's responsibility to make sure they get one from the contractor when laid off. Your application cannot be submitted without one. It is the contractor's responsibility to issue one in accordance with our contract.

S.U.B. BENEFITS: Report to the hall promptly upon layoff. You must complete a S.U.B. Application within seven days from your layoff date or you will forfeit S.U.B. benefits. Lay-off slips must accompany the application to be eligible. Proof of UIA benefit payments must be submitted within 21 days of when you were paid in order to receive SUB benefits. Do not submit your sub applications directly to the fund office. Your application must be signed by the hall or you will not collect benefits.

OUT-OF-WORK LIST: You must be on the out-of-work list to collect S.U.B. benefits or SASMI. Members must re-register biannually: March 1 through March 20 and Sept. 1 through 20. If you fail to re-register you will be removed from the list.

SHORT WORK WEEK SUB PAY: If you work 16 hours or less in a week or have a short work week due to weather you may collect sub for that week but only if it is at the beginning or the end of a layoff. You may NOT collect if you are not laid off. You must complete a sub application at the hall, provide a pay stub for that week and the hall will submit it to the fund office. If you are not laid off and it is due to weather the company MUST provide written documentation that it was weather related.

As November's general election approaches, there is a clear choice before all IBEW voters at the ballot box. President Biden has made his commitment to improving the lives of IBEW members no secret. Under his leadership, historical investments in infrastructure, manufacturing, and renewable utilities have put us in position to thrive during a once-in-a-generation electrical construction boom. 



# Worker heat protection is now a political flashpoint?

water, rest and shade. This leaves about two million workers in Florida, the hottest state in the country, vulnerable to extreme heat conditions starting July 1, 2024," says the Laborers Health and Safety Fund of North America. "Supporters of HB 433 say that barring municipalities from enacting their own ordinances would help avoid 'a confusing patchwork' of heat laws across the state. However, they neglect to mention that there are no statewide laws protecting workers from heat in the first place."

States with their own safety agencies are generally free to adopt health and safety regulations that are stronger than federal OSHA standards. And currently, California, Oregon, Washington, Colorado and Minnesota all have their own state heat standards, which have provided upgraded safety rules for workers vs. those in place by federal OSHA. But GOP-led legislatures in Florida, and previously Texas, both adopted statewide laws preventing local jurisdictions from creating rules around occupational heat exposure.

The Biden Administration's top bullet point in its July 2 release says: "OSHA is proposing a rule to protect workers, that, if finalized, would establish the nation's first-ever federal safety standard addressing excessive heat in the workplace. The risk that extreme heat poses to certain workers has long been recognized - even apart from the impacts of climate change.<sup>2</sup>

Juley Fulcher, worker health and safety advocate with Public Citizen, said the White House's "simple measures to protect workers - water breaks, a cool spot to recover, and rest - will provide key protection from illness, injury and death. Several states have put workplace heat protections in place and elected officials in Florida and Texas have taken action to strip workers of heat-related protections. The punitive cruelty of denying workers access to water and protection from heat by elected officials has been monstrous."

A July 3 article in *Politico* called attention to the trend, and said there's a "red-blue divide over heat protections for workers in these two states (California vs. Florida)."

You can look at safety standards in each state, whether it's heat standards or others, and it'll track with how union-dense those states are," said Lorena Gonzalez, head of the California Labor Federation to Politico. "Workers don't have the same rights in Florida that they have in California."



#### **PROSTATE CANCER IS THE** second most common cancer in

men. So, it only makes sense to ask your doctor about the risks and benefits of screening for prostate cancer.

However, most diagnosed prostate cancers are slow-growing. A simple blood or urine test called the prostate specific antigen (PSA) might be all you need, if your doctor recommends it.

PSA screening tests are improving, with researchers at the University of Michigan (U of M) developing a PSA test that is 97 percent accurate in ruling out the most aggressive prostate cancer.

#### What's New?

While this U of M test may be the latest evolution of prostate screening, early detection of aggressive forms of the disease, as well as minimizing overdiagnosis have become important priorities in modern prostate cancer care.

The recent advances in the PSA test hone in on identifying the biomarkers that consistently appear in the most aggressive form of prostate cancer.

And there are a host of new diagnostic tools, such as advanced MRI imaging and genetic tests to improve accuracy and keep treatment as noninvasive as possible.

Your urologist must order a PSA test, though not all doctors automatically recommend having one. Screening risks include false-positive results which can lead to unnecessary tests and treatments with the potential to create more harm.

A discussion with your doctor should come first, and if a PSA test is recommended, you may want to ask about which specific test will be ordered.

# **Reduces Unnecessary Procedures**

#### It's OK to "Watch-and-Wait"

For those with test results indicating the slow-growing type of prostate cancer, there's good news. Instead of rushing to order a biopsy, which can be painful, the "watch-and-wait" approach has proven effective in avoiding unnecessary procedures while still monitoring for any changes that might require treatment later on.

A study that followed 2,200 patients for up to a decade found that "Watch-and-Wait" was equal to the results of those who received early treatment. In other words, those who waited to start treatment had the same outcomes of those who started treatment early.

But a big difference was that for the 49 percent of men who remained free of disease progression, there was no need to perform unnecessary biopsies or surgeries. Nearly all of the men entered the study with a diagnosis of a less serious grade 1 prostate tumor. After ten years in the study, only 2 percent developed metastatic prostate cancer, meaning their cancer spread to other parts of their body, and less than one percent died of their disease.

Task Force (USPSTF) recommends that men aged 55 to 69 years old make individual decisions about whether to get a PSA test after talking with their doctor. Individual risk factors include a family history of prostate cancer, and since African-American men have higher rates of prostate cancer they too fall in a higher risk category.

Other medical conditions may affect your decision, as well as understanding the benefits and harms associated with screening, including those associated with other tests and treatment.

Men who are 70 and older should not be screened for prostate cancer routinely. Again, individuals may choose to consult with their doctor to evaluate their specific circumstances. Generally, prostate cancer found in older men tends to be of the slow growing type.

John T. Wei, M.D. at Michigan Medicine reflected about the state of prostate cancer diagnosis in an article published by Michigan Medicine: "Twenty years ago, we were looking for any kind of cancer. Now we realize that slow-growing cancer doesn't need to be treated. All of a sudden, the game changed. We went from having to find any cancer to finding only significant cancer."

# <u>Outdoors</u> Michigan's wolf population



Michigan's wolf population in the Upper Peninsula is stable, and is likely improving a bit. Wolves in the Lower Peninsula are proving harder to find and count.

Here's what the DNR found, according to a report released June 13:

Upper Peninsula. The Michigan Department of Natural Resources reported that their 2024 winter wolf population survey estimate found a minimum of 762 wolves in the Upper Peninsula. This year's estimate showed an increase of 131 animals compared to the 2022 estimate of 631; however, the results demonstrate a continued trend of statistical stability in Michigan's wolf population.

"This year's survey findings are statistically consistent with our wolf population surveys for the past 14 years," said Brian Roell, the DNR's large carnivore specialist. "When a wild population reaches this stable point, it is typical to see slight variations from year to year, indicating that gray wolves may have reached their biological carrying capacity in the Upper Peninsula."

In other words, Michigan's U.P. wolf population has achieved an equilibrium between availability of habitat and the number of wolves that habitat can support over time.

The survey, completed last winter, found the population distributed among 158 packs in the Upper Peninsula, with an average of 4.8 wolves per pack. This year's survey represents the highest population estimate since 2012, when the department began doing the semiannual survey. The survey is conducted during the winter because it relies in part on identifying wolf tracks in the snow.

Prior to the winter of 2007, the DNR sought to count wolves throughout the entire Upper Peninsula. However, as the wolf population increased, this peninsula-wide survey method became more difficult and time-consuming, especially the process of distinguishing among adjacent packs.

As a result, the department developed and evaluated a differ-

ent sampling method to reduce the search area and allow additional time to accurately count wolves in neighboring territories.

The new approach uses a geographic stratification – essentially breaking up regions into small pieces and ensuring those regions have representative samples - and produces an unbiased, precise minimum estimate of wolf abundance in Michigan's U.P. during midwinter when wolves are at their lowest point in their yearly population cycle.

The DNR is currently evaluating two other techniques for estimating wolf abundance in the U.P. One relies on a track survey similar to the department's current method. The other uses trail cameras spread across the U.P.

If successful, these additional techniques may have advantages over the current methodology, mainly by decreasing staff time. The camera model would have the added benefit of producing estimates at times of the year other than winter.

Lower Peninsula. At the same time, the department plans to continue its search for wolves in the Lower Peninsula. The last survey for the presence of wolves in the northern Lower Peninsula

occurred in 2019. A new survey is planned for early 2025.

Monitoring wolf presence in the northern Lower Peninsula is significantly different than in the Upper Peninsula because wolves, if present in the Lower Peninsula, are at such low-density levels the track survey protocol used in the U.P. is impractical.

Instead, a targeted search approach based on resident reports of wolves or wolf sign – such as tracks or scat-is used to concentrate efforts in areas more likely to have wolves. The department also plans on testing some new technology using trace DNA collected from fresh tracks left in the snow to verify suspected wolf presence.

Although it is possible that individual wolves currently occupy the Lower Peninsula, as of April 2023, the state's wolf population is not known to extend to that part of Michigan.

During the 2011 targeted winter track survey, and shortly after the 2015 survey period, tracks consistent with a wolf were observed in Cheboygan and Emmet counties. In 2014, biologists from the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians captured what appeared to be a wolf on a

trail camera and were able to collect a scat sample. DNA analysis of the scat confirmed the animal to be a male wolf.

The last wolf identified in the Lower Peninsula was a male wolf taken in January 2024 in Calhoun County by a coyote hunter. An investigation into the matter failed to determine how the wolf came to be in Calhoun County.

"Research has suggested that there is suitable habitat for wolves in the northern Lower Peninsula," said Roell. "However, this habitat is fragmented and the ability of wolves to travel the landscape among these habitat patches is uncertain. Suitable habitat becomes even more patchy in the more populated southern Lower Peninsula, which makes it unlikely that wolves would establish themselves there.'

Wolves in Michigan are currently protected under the federal Endangered Species Act by federal court order. As a result of this status, wolves can be killed only if they are a direct and immediate threat to human life. Because wolves in Michigan long ago attained federal and state population goals, the DNR continues to advocate for returning wolves to state management.

# No construction slowdown in Michigan, or elsewhere

May 2023. Meanwhile, total U.S. construction project starts are also up - by 10 percent in May vs. April, to a seasonally adjusted rate for \$1.24 trillion.

Dodge Data and Analytics reported June 20 that slow-moving federal infrastructure dollars are finally into the pipeline, with the "nonbuilding" category up 49 percent from April to May. On a yearto-date basis from January through May, total construction starts were up 11 percent compared to the first five months of 2023. Residential project starts also saw a strong 16 percent gain from April to May.

"Even though May's gain in construction starts was mainly due to a handful of large projects, the data highlights that there is some grassroots demand building in the market," said Richard Branch, chief economist of Dodge Construction Network. "Single-family starts, in particular, have risen in 8 of the last 12 months despite high mortgage rates. Growth in single-family will incentivize further demand for retail, health, and education starts, among others, and the stability in the Dodge Momentum Index, which tracks projects in planning, underscores this optimism."

The Associated Builders and Contractors estimated earlier this year that the building industry has a shortfall of about 500,000 construction workers.

The AGC said that nonresidential contractors report continual difficulty filling positions despite the job gains. "Construction firms have been adding workers at a faster clip than most sectors," said Simonson, "But contractors say they are still having trouble finding enough skilled workers to meet the demand for data centers, manufacturing plants, renewable energy, and infrastructure projects.'

# **Biden Administration rule sets wage,** training standards for energy work

than 1.5 million additional jobs will be created because of the law over the next decade.

"Today's final rule is another obvious example of the Biden-Harris Administration's rock-solid commitment to the working families of the construction industry," said North America's Building Trades Unions Secretary-Treasurer Sean McGarvey. "The gravity of placing strong labor standards in a law that will impact the transition to clean energy sources more than any single public policy before cannot be understated. This is historic.

"This final rule ensures the benefits of prevailing wage and apprenticeship utilization provisions will be strong, purposeful, and, most importantly, open more family-sustaining, middle-class career opportunities in the clean energy industry for millions of union and nonunion construction workers across the country."

The Department of Labor lists 13 clean energy "pre-construction" or "under-construction" projects in Michigan that are being erected in conjunction with the Clean Energy Act's tax incentives. The bulk of them are solar projects, and those that exceed 100 megawatts are in Branch, Calhoun, Gratiot, Muskegon, Oceana and St. Clair counties.

The final rules from the Treasury Department - which were developed in close partnership with the U.S. Department of Labor - provide clarity and certainty on prevailing wage requirements "to ensure the clean energy transition is centered around workers," a White House statement said.

The pay standard requirements are in place for work under clean energy tax incentives that include utility-scale wind, solar, and battery storage projects, as well as for credits for carbon capture, utilization, and storage and clean hydrogen projects.

The prevailing wage and apprenticeship requirements took effect in January 2023. The final rules follow consideration of more than 300 public comments in response to the proposed rules.


